## Reflection

The Tempest by William Shakespeare has served as an important novel for reinterpretation due to its many themes of colonialism. The entire book has been written to show the beginnings of slavery and the journey to the Americas. My group wanted to take a new perspective on the ideas behind *The Tempest*, and twist the story to show the motives of some of the more minor characters. The interpretation our new story will serve to show is the power dynamics between characters that have little to no power over the people above them.

The form of our project will be in a painting. It will serve to show our purpose because it will be a visual representation of the new storyline we have created. The first major power dynamic will be in the relationship between Alonso and Gonzalo. In our version, we have made Gonzalo a dishonest old councilor to Alonso. He works with Prospero who has bribed him into thinking that he will help Gonzalo overthrow Alonso to become king. The second power dynamic is now between Gonzalo and Prospero. Prospero acts like he is helping Gonzalo when really, he is feeding off of all the information Gonzalo is giving him in order to overthrow Alonso and become king himself. These both show power dynamics with Gonzalo wanting power over Alonso, and Prospero actually now having power over Gonzalo, while trying to have power over Alonso as well. The third and fourth power dynamics are between Ferdinand, Miranda, and Caliban. Since Caliban has been Prospero's slave, he has been with Miranda as well for quite a while on the island and they fall in love. Miranda is already married to

Ferdinand, so he must fight him in order to be with his true love. Since Ferdinand is of royal status, he is being overthrown by a slave, who clearly has no power over him. After finally uniting with Miranda, Caliban must now fight with Prospero in order to gain freedom for himself as well as to be with Miranda. Prospero is Caliban's master, so of course going for his daughter would be a challenge against power that Caliban is willing to take. Our painting will show depictions of all of these power dynamics through the emotions that each character feels as they embark on gaining power over their respective rulers.
